

AVIATION ICON BOB HOOVER PASSES AT 94

Hoover film to be shown at November 2nd CAPA Meeting



The man who most consider the most accomplished pilot of all time died today at age 94. The legendary Bob Hoover passed away of congestive heart failure at a hospital in Torrance, California this morning at 1 AM. He had lost his wife earlier this year, and leaves a son, a daughter, and several grandchildren..

Even General Chuck Yeager, perhaps the most famous test pilot of his generation, was humbled by Hoover, describing him in the foreword to Hoover's 1996 autobiography, "Forever Flying," as "the greatest pilot I ever saw." World War II hero Jimmy Doolittle, an aviation pioneer of an earlier generation, called Hoover "the greatest stick-and-rudder man that ever lived."

Hoover's flying career began when he was a teenager. He soon enlisted and flew in World War II as a fighter pilot. After being shot down over Italy and spending 16 months in a German POW camp, he famously escaped by stealing a Fw190 fighter and flying it to the Netherlands.

He went on to become a U.S. Air Force test pilot alongside Chuck Yeager and later revolutionized aerobatics with his airshow routines in his instantly recognizable green and white Shrike Commander and yellow P-51 Mustang.

The movie ***Flying the Feathered Edge: The Bob Hoover Project*** recounts these stories and his entire storied career in detail, and will be our featured presentation at next Wednesday's November 2nd meeting of the Cape Area Pilots Association.
